“Come and eat my bread”

The first reading of today’s Mass is a call to evangelisation. Wisdom has “despatched her maidservants” and invites all to come in. Jesus said: “Go out into the roads and the lanes” (*Luke 14:23*).

One of the frequently quoted sayings in the Church today is “from maintenance to mission” — a saying that speaks of the need to go out and proclaim, not just stay in and praise. It is this that inspires our Alpha initiative.

The choice of this first reading with the Gospel for today encourages us to give a Eucharistic interpretation to the passage, but the context within the Book of Proverbs does not require such an interpretation. The invitation is, quite simply, to come for a meal, and come and find out what wisdom has to offer.

This is, in fact the invitation of Alpha: Come to a meal and find out! The vision is that everyone should have the opportunity to explore faith in the context of the Church community, and all over the world people have come to a new love for Jesus and a new understanding of the Christian Faith through Alpha.

We have now run Alpha twice, and many blessings have come to the parish. We have a new web-site (not fully completed, but do have a look at www.stgregory.org.uk), we have had offers to help in many different areas of church life from people who have either come into the Church or whose faith has been re-awakened through Alpha.

The evenings offer and opportunity for anyone to freely explore their unique questions about life, faith and God. Each session begins with a shared meal, and on a table of about eight people, new friendships are formed. It is a real meal (not just a snack), so don’t eat before you come!

At the end of the meal there is a video presentation, which contains a variety of different styles. Each week a particular question is addressed, beginning with “Is there more to life than this?”

It has been said that there is “God-shaped hole” in each of us, and that life without God is an incomplete life. People seek to fill this hole with all sorts of different things. For some, in throwing themselves into their work they hope to find fulfilment, for others sports or some hobby. Some seek fulfilment in “New Age” philosophy in some form or another. More destructively, some seek meaning in life through drugs, gambling or other such activities.

The Gospel and the Church has a message for everyone, and particularly for those who are actively seeking for meaning in life. However, they need the invitation to find that meaning, or they may continue searching where there is no answer to be found. We are the very people who can deliver that invitation.

After the video, there is conversation on the tables about the questions raised in the film. It is only in the small group on the table. Here anyone is free to say anything they want; there are no “wrong” ideas if people say what they genuinely believe.

Of course, there may be disagreement, but this is not a time for a “teacher” to tell other people the “correct” answer. Rather, through conversation, people are invited to consider other ideas. The results show that the vast majority of Alpha participants come out with a closer relationship with God.

Today’s first reading is an encouragement to us to invite someone to share in the table that has been laid. Invite a friend, and come together. One other result of feedback from Alpha is that nearly everyone who comes on it enjoys it!

St Thomas Becket Catholic School “A” Level results

More than 20 per cent of all grades attained at Thomas Becket Catholic School were A*-A grades, with two thirds of all results secured achieving at least a C or equivalent.

Consequently, a large number of students will now be going on to some of the country’s leading universities to study courses from law to the sciences.

Ciran Stapleton, headteacher, said: “We are so proud of what our students have achieved. They have worked hard to get the top grades they needed in some really difficult qualifications.”

Emily Thomas, for example, completed her A2 qualifications with grades of A, B, C while Patrick Kaminski completed his BTEC qualification with 3 D*, equivalent to 3 A*s. Paulina Luczak and Alina Tudor both attained AAA.

Mr Stapleton added: “What is really pleasing is that so many students haven’t just secured the grades they were aiming for, they have surpassed and exceeded their targets. They really have shown what can be achieved with dedication and belief.”

Mrs Harrison, head of sixth form, added: “While we are deeply proud of the grades that these young people are leaving with, we take just as much satisfaction in knowing that the class on 2018 are going on to the next phase of their lives as responsible and caring individuals.

“They have a strong sense of values and moral purpose. I have no doubt that they will go on to become real assets for their communities.”

Scripture Readings 19th August 2018, 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

The Book of Proverbs gives pithy maxims for right living, applying the Law to real life. God's word is here seen personified as Wisdom, urging us: “Come and eat my bread, drink the wine I have prepared”.

The psalm urges us to glorify the Lord, grateful that he has rescued us from danger. Therefore we should fear the Lord, “keeping our tongue from evil”.

Paul tells the Ephesians to enjoy food and wine, but they should “not drug” themselves with wine. And after singing psalms and hymns in community they should “go on singing and chanting to the Lord in their hearts”, so giving thanks to God.

Chapter six of John's Gospel reaches the climax of Jesus' teaching on the Eucharist. The Gospel's prologue tells us that “the Word

became flesh”: the Wisdom of God took our human flesh to share the trials of this world with us. Jesus gives us his flesh and blood to sustain us on our journey, as he fed Elijah. Jesus insists that physically eating and drinking must be part of the Eucharist so that we take his “Word become flesh” into our very beings. Not surprisingly, some Jews – like us – find it difficult to link together the spiritual and material worlds, as did the Samaritan woman, and Nicodemus.

Psalm Response: **Taste and see that the Lord is good.**

(Proverbs 9: 1-6; Psalm 33(34); Eph 5: 15-20; John 6: 51-58)

Bible for Beginners Please join us for a series of short meetings to discover and read the Bible: What is the Bible? Who wrote it? How do I read it? What does it mean? Friday evenings during Autumn and Spring terms, starting 8.00 pm, finishing promptly at 9.30. First meeting Friday 7th September. Bible Timeline The Bible contains many different types of writings; there is history and story; there is poetry and song; there is prophesy and there are letters; there is a style called “Apocalyptic” and a type of writing which we call “Wisdom Literature”. The Bible Timeline course mainly concentrates on the history – the sequence of events; but this is the frame within which we are able to locate the other forms of writing in the Bible. The Book of Proverbs is one of the books of “Wisdom Literature”; do come on the Bible Timeline course and find out where it fits in the overall story — on Tuesday evenings at St Gregory's, starting on September 4th at 7.00 pm. All are welcome — the course is pastoral, not academic, and is designed to help us see the relevance of the Bible in our life today.

Psalms The rest of the Bible tells of God's saving plan, revealed in stories and history, and prophesy. The Psalms are the response of mankind, raised in prayer and praise. In this course we learn of the prayer of Jesus and of a real school of prayer for ourselves. On Monday afternoons at St Gregory's from 1.00 pm to 3.00 pm. — There is a course book, priced at £21.

The course on Ephesians is shorter; only 8 sessions, and will, run on Tuesday mornings in school term time from September to Advent. St Paul's letter to the Ephesians reveals many remarkable gifts that we, as Christians, are given in the Church. This letter tells us about the nature of the Church — as a body, as a household, as a mystery, as a communion, as a bride, and as an army. It shows us the great inheritance that awaits us as adopted sons and daughters in the family of God, and it reveals how God's great love for us can transform our lives. This course will enrich your faith and show you how to live it out. The study book is priced at £20

John The fourth Gospel tells us of the Word of God, made flesh for us and now given to us as the “bread of life”. On Tuesday mornings at St Gregory's after Christmas, starting on 8th January at 10.00 am.

Like many of our Opening Prayers, this one dates back into the 7th century. .

We are reminded of St Paul saying: “What no eye has seen and no ear has heard, what the mind of man cannot visualise, all that God has prepared for those who love him”
(1 Corinthians 2:9).

O God, who have prepared for those who love you good things which no eye can see, fill our hearts, we pray, with the warmth of your love, so that, loving you in all things and above all things, we may attain your promises, which surpass every human desire.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reign with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Just as what God has prepared for us is beyond our wildest imagining, so we pray that our love for God may be beyond all our earthly loves and desires.

Loving God “in all things” takes us back to St Paul: “One God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all.” (*Ephesians 4:6*). Loving God implies a demand for respect for all God's creation.
