### **Divine Renovation**

An influential book was published four years ago by a young priest in Nova Scotia, Fr James Mallon, entitled "Divine Renovation". It has the subtitle of "Bringing your parish from maintenance to mission. This book has been translated into six languages and has sold over 65,000 copies.

The book is not a work of aspiration — is comes from the solid basis of what has been achieved in his parish of St Benedict, Halifax, Nova Scotia. In the past year Fr Mallon has been lecturing on the subject of his book all over the world, and several times here in England.

In this country there are many parishes that have already taken up the challenge of moving "from Maintenance to Mission" inspired by Fr Mallon's book, and within our own Diocese we and a few other parishes are amongst them.

"We are a missionary organisation but we function as a club," Fr Mallon said of the Catholic Church. "A club is something that exists for its members. The Church is the only organisation that exists for those who don't belong, it's outward focussed. We talk about moving a parish from maintenance to mission. With maintenance, your primary concern is for the people you've got and keeping them happy. A missionary Church is a Church that, without neglecting its members, its primary concern is the people you don't have."

It is the same vision that has inspired successive Popes who have spoken about the "New Evangelisation" and "Missionary Disciples".

Fr Mallon makes the point that this cannot be achieved by a priest alone, however dedicated and hard-working, and this was illustrated by a story told by a layman attending a church for Sunday Mass while on holiday with his family. At the door he was welcomed and given books and a newsletter, and invited to find a seat. Each row, while nearly empty, had a person sat on the end seat, and choosing a pew, the person on the end who had to be passed to get to the empty seats was clearly displeased at being disturbed. Throughout the Mass those nearby made it clear that the presence of children was unwelcome — the children were ignored at the sign of peace and although there was an invitation from the priest to refreshments after Mass, nobody spoke to them. If they had just moved into that parish, they would not have gone there again. Hospitality is the work of the congregation, not just the person at the door.

The most obvious sign of our sharing in the vision of Divine Renovation is the running of the Alpha course. This is the primary way in which we are outward focussed. It is also where we show that we are all missionary disciples, in that we are all able to invite someone to come to an Alpha course here.

Just as we can all be welcoming to those who sit near us for Mass, we can all offer in invitation to someone who is at present outside the Church. Through Alpha, many have come into the Faith, or come back to the Faith. Could you be the person who invites?

### A Bright Future at Thomas Becket Catholic School

Students and staff are celebrating at Thomas Becket Catholic School after securing a set of results that have been described as "game-changing".

Results across almost every measure have improved with one key government measure, Progress 8, projected to see a significant swing in the right direction.

Ciran Stapleton, head teacher, said: "I am absolutely blown away by what our young people have achieved.

"While there have been some brilliant individual performances, with some students rightly proving they are amongst the very best by securing the new coveted 9 grade, what is particularly pleasing is that our young people are not just meeting their targets – they are exceeding them.

"In maths, for example, our students were on average half a grade up

on what was predicted and of national expectation. There is a similar story in English and a host of other subjects. This is testament to the talent and commitment of everyone in our community".

Mr Stapleton added: "I really do think that these results are a huge milestone for the school. In fact, they are game changing. When I joined this school just over 12 months ago what was needed more than anything was belief. Moving our Progress 8 score from a negative figure to what, I believe, will be a positive figure shows what has been achieved.

"It has now set the standard for our next cohort of Year 11s. It means that we are able to welcome a record number of students into our Sixth Form. It will act as the platform for our staff to continue to embrace new ideas and challenge themselves and our students.

"I am very proud of our community. The future is very bright indeed."

### Scripture Readings 26th August 2018, 21st Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

The Book of Joshua summarises Israel's history from the death of Moses until they settle in the Promised Land. Before he dies Joshua invites the tribes of Israel to promise to obey the Lord and to put aside all other gods. In solemn assembly the people rehearse all the Lord did for them when Moses led them through the desert. Three times they solemnly renew the covenant by the stone at Shechem, in Samaria.

Last week the psalm urged us to fear the Lord; now it assures us that the Lord rescues the just man from all misfortune.

Our last reading from Paul's letter to the Ephesians: we must imitate Christ, whatever our role in society. We should "be subject to one another". "Wives, be subject to your husbands" and "children, obey your parents"; balanced by "fathers, do not provoke your children" and "husbands, love your wives".

In chapter six of John's Gospel we hear more reactions to Jesus' teaching on the Eucharist. Like Nicodemus not understanding how he could be "born from above", many disciples could not accept this teaching. Why is eating his flesh more difficult to accept than his Ascension? These things are "real" – part of the heavenly realm, which we are invited to share, but life given only by the Spirit.

Psalm Response:

Taste and see that the Lord is good.

**Bible for Beginners** Please join us for a series of short meetings to discover and read the Bible: What is the Bible? Who wrote it? How do I read it? What does it mean? Friday evenings during Autumn and Spring terms, starting 8.00 pm, finishing promptly at 9.30. First meeting Friday 7th September. Bible Timeline The first five books of the Old Testament are regarded by the Jewish people as the *Torah* (The Books of the Law). Joshua is the first book after these first five, and is normally classed as one of the books of history, but it should be remembered that the historian is writing from a strong religious standpoint. The Bible Timeline course helps us to understand how these book relate together, and is at St Gregory's on Tuesday evenings through the autumn and winter. It would be impossible to over-emphasise just how valuable this opportunity is. The study books have arrived; they are priced at £32. The course offers an overview of the whole of the Bible, helping to put each book into context and understand God's plan of salvation. On Tuesday evenings at St Gregory's, starting on September 4<sup>th</sup> at 7.00 pm. All are welcome—the course is pastoral, not academic, and is designed to help us see the relevance of the Bible in our life today.

<u>Psalms</u> The rest of the Bible tells of God's saving plan, revealed in stories and history, and prophesy. The Psalms are the response of mankind, raised in prayer and praise. In this course we learn of the prayer of Jesus and of a real school of prayer for ourselves. On Monday afternoons at St Gregory's from 1.00 pm to 3.00 pm. — There is a course book, priced at £21.

The course on Ephesians is shorter; only 8 sessions, and will, run on Tuesday mornings in school term time from September to Advent. St Paul's letter to the Ephesians reveals many remarkable gifts that we, as Christians, are given in the Church. This letter tells us abiut the nature of the Church — as a body, as a household, as a mystery, as a communion, as a bride, and as an army. It shows us the great inheritance that awaits us as adopted sons and daughters in the family of God, and it reveals how God's great love for us can transform our lives. This course will enrich your faith and show you how to live it out. The study book is priced at £20

<u>John</u> "You have the message of eternal life" said Peter in today's Gospel. The fourth Gospel tells us of the Word of God, made flesh for us and now given to us as the "bread of life". In the course of John we are helped better to grasp this message. On Tuesday mornings at St Gregory's after Christmas, starting on 8<sup>th</sup> January at 10.00 am.

This prayer is a poetic interpretation of the great prayer of Deuteronomy, the "Shema Yisra'eil", quoted by Our Lord: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength." (Mark 12:30 and Deuteronomy 6:5)

O God, who cause the minds of the faithful to unite in a single purpose, grant your people to love what you command and to desire what you promise, that, amid the uncertainties of this world, our hearts may be fixed on that place where true gladness is found.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reign with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

We can also see an echo of Jesus' teaching: "Store up for yourselves treasures in heaven . . . for where your treasure is there your heart will be also" (Matthew 6:20, 21)

It is not only moths, rust and thieving that cause uncertainties in this world; but the certainty of the eternal love of God is wat should unite us in a single purpose: to fulfil His commands.
